Getting to campus

From ROC airport

The quickest route involves taking a taxi/lyft/uber to campus. The airport is only around 10 minutes from campus, and the rates are generally ~\$18-20.

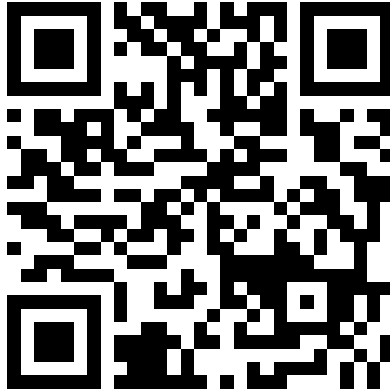

FINDING YOUR WAY

Rush Rhees Library - The domed building which sits at the heart of the University of Rochester. Rush Rhees is home to *The Robbins Library*, *The Gamble Room*, *Rare Books*, and *The Humanities Center*.

- *The Robbins Library*: A reference library located on the fourth floor of Rush Rhees.
- *The Gamble Room*: A conference room located on the third floor of Rush Rhees.
- *The Humanities Center*: A series of conference rooms located on the second floor of Rush Rhees.
- *Rare Books and Special Collections*: An academic department located on the second floor of Rush Rhees.

Christ Church Rochester: A historic Episcopalian church located on East Avenue in Downtown Rochester.

Memorial Art Gallery: Part of the University of Rochester, the gallery (locally known as “the MAG”) can be found on University Avenue just to the east of Downtown Rochester.
